#### **MOTOR VEHICLE COMPREHENSIVE INSURANCE**

##### **1.0 ABOUT ANTI-CORRUPTION COALITION UGANDA:**

Anti-Corruption Coalition Uganda (ACCU) was formed in January 1999 and formally registered as an NGO under the NGO Statute in 2004. ACCU brings together like-minded entities and individual actors whose pre-occupation is publicizing, exposing and advocating for curbing corruption in Uganda. ACCU, with support from different Development Partners, has been implementing interventions since 1999 to create an accountable and corruption-free society. At the national level, ACCU works with Civil Society Organizations (CSOs) engaged in the accountability sector. At the local level, ACCU works with and through Regional Anti-Corruption Coalitions (RACCs) that are spread out in the various parts of the country and, of recent, grassroots member organizations.<sup>1</sup> This approach ensures that the citizens' voices are reflected in the national agenda.

##### **2.0 PROJECT BACKGROUND:**

According to the Inspectorate of Government, Uganda loses approximately UGX 9.14tn to corruption annually which is approximately 18% of the national budget.<sup>1</sup> Transparency International in 2025 scored Uganda at 25% and was ranked in the 148<sup>th</sup> position out of 182 countries assessed. In its strategy to fight corruption, the Government of Uganda has established about 22 anti-corruption institutions<sup>2</sup>, and enacted over 18 anti-corruption laws<sup>3</sup> to address the problem. Despite the efforts, corruption in Uganda still remains endemic and systemic, with indications of getting worse.

Corruption in Uganda is mainly caused by; weak citizen capacity to engage government on accountability, limited citizen monitoring of public services, limited access to information, low state responsiveness to citizen accountability demands, poor implementation of anti- corruption laws, limited capacity of anti-corruption agencies, impunity, patronage and mild political will to fight some forms of corruption. The unabated corruption has resulted into; poor public service delivery, high cost of delivering public services, increasing national debt burden, denial of basic human rights, under-development and worsening economic conditions.

In order to address some of these challenges, ACCU is implementing the Civic Engagement for Accountability Project (CEAP). The project aims to strengthen accountability of state actors in Uganda and; enhance the capacity of non-state actors to demand for accountability. This will ultimately contribute to improved transparency and accountability among state and non- state actors in Uganda. The project is implemented at national level and 10 districts of; Yumbe, Terego, Madi-Okollo, Pakwach and Obongi in West Nile and; Moroto, Napak, Kotido, Nakapiripirit and Nabilatuk in Karamoja. The project targets 7,200 youth; 1,360 government stakeholders; 50 CSOs; 100 Community Based Monitors and; 9,840,200 citizens directly and indirectly.

### **3.0 JUSTIFICATION:**

As part of executing her mandate, ACCU implements activities, projects and programs at the national level and in different regions of the country. This requires frequent movement of staff members, Board members, partners and service providers, to different areas of implementation. As an organization, ACCU also has day-in-day-out errands that need to be executed at the national level in Kampala. These constant movements expose vehicles to the risks of damage, breakdown and loss, and therefore requires comprehensive insurance.

The essence of acquiring comprehensive motor vehicle insurance includes: Covering for loss or damage to the vehicle; Covering the cost of car rental to keep ACCU operations moving in the interim; Covering a new-for-old replacement and; Covering the vehicle for fire, theft, storm damage, floods and any other unforeseen calamity. Therefore, as part of the project's wellness for staff, ACCU intends to purchase comprehensive insurance for one motor vehicle through a provider that will be selected by the procurement team.

### **4.0 OBJECTIVE OF THE ASSIGNMENT**

The general objective of this assignment is to procure a service provider to provide motor vehicle comprehensive insurance cover for one vehicle for a period of one year.
